RMS Selected as 2019 "School to Watch"

Randolph Middle School was recently recognized for academic excellence, developmental responsiveness, social equity and organizational structures and named the 10th "School to Watch" in New Jersey. RMS was the only school recognized this year.

"The Schools to Watch recognition validates the excellent and effective work of the Randolph Middle School teachers and staff," RMS Principal Dr. Dennis Copeland. "The academic programs, support services and extra curricular activities in the arts, academics, and athletics all contribute to the development of the RMS whole child."

RHS Earns College Board AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award

Randolph High School has earned the first College Board AP® Computer Science Female Diversity Award for achieving high female representation in AP Computer Science Principles. Schools honored with the AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award have expanded girls' access in AP Computer Science courses. Out of more than 18,000 secondary schools worldwide that offer AP courses, Randolph is one of only 685 to accomplish this.

"We're honored by this recognition and are proud of our female students studying computer science for their achievements and our dedicated teachers who educate and support our students each day," said Randolph Township Schools Superintendent Jennifer A. Fano. "We are excited to continue to provide access to AP Computer Science courses to advance a more diverse workforce in critical STEM fields."


Schools receiving the AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award have either 50 percent or higher female representation in one of the two AP computer science courses or a percentage of the female computer science examinees meeting or exceeding that of the school's female population.
